1991 Double Tenth

Monday, 7 October 1991, 50 SACO delegates arrived at the Chiang Kaí-shek International Airport in Taiwan to begin eight days of unforgettable entertainment as guests of the Military Intelligence Bureau of ROC. Our most gracious host, Lt. Gen. Yin Tsung-wen, Director of the MIB, planned a most exciting itinerary to see that everyone experienced one of the greatest thrills of a lifetime. After a Tuesday morning rest, with the exception of six representatives making VIP calls, the group visited the Taipei World Trade Center which was adjacent to our hotel, the Grand Hyatt, Taipei's newest. The six representatives called on Lt. Gen. Yin at the MIB, Gen. Sung Hsin-lien, Director of the National Security Bureau and Admirai Yeh Chang-tung, COMINCH of the ROC Navy.

Wednesday morning the MIB hosted a tea party at which the delegates met many former Bureau friends who are now retired. In the afternoon the delegation went to the "One Heart and One Mind" celebration, an extraordinary show of talent by the youth of Taiwan. That evening, Gen. Chao Chih-yuan, Vice Chief of the General Staff hosted a banquet.

Thursday, the Double Tenth, Paul Casamajor, the delegation chairman, was asked to represent the delegation to attend H.E. President Lee Teng-hui's foreign visitors reception at the Presidential Building. The entire delegation attended the parade and in the evening went to a reception at the Taipei Guest House hosted by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Friday, the group made a trip to Tzu Hu and Tou Liao to pay homage at the temporary resting places of the late Presidents Chiang Kai-shek and Chiang Ching-kuo. The group then traveled to the "Window on China", a park of miniturized symbols of the cultural heritage of China. The lunch there was hosted by Maj. Gen. and Mrs. Chang Wen-huan, Deputy Director of the MIB. This busy day included a visit to the Veterans Home in Taoyuan ... again, a pleasurable, even




though extremely emotional and moving event. This is, without a doubt, one of the most touching of all scheduled events in Taiwan and once you have lived this experience there is a desire to return should there be opportunities to do so. On our visit here in 1982, Bill Bartee said it for all of us as we returned to our bus: "Don't anyone say a word to me for 15 minutes".











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




The final day, Monday the 14th, included the National Palace Museum, the Taiwan Handicraft Promotion Center and the farewell dinner banquet hosted by Lt.




COMMEMORATED Through Contribution To The ARLEIGH

First off, thank for returning the "snap" of the White House (Chungking) - I had not missed it, of course. I sure would love to see the area again although my memory of the building, its area and the mountains remain vivid.

l, too, had contact from Scurlock; a rare letter complete with "un-business" card! We had a great time in Taiwan ('89)and l regret being unable to repeat. He also sent snaps which included Billy Hall whom I feel I would have recognized at once. Ken Brown was a surprize. Unless my memory is more leaky than I think, my last recollection of him was that he was loading a 6x6 with radio gear, a generator, some batteries...and heading for the hills outside of Shanghai.

My old "roomie," John Waters and his secretary Fran keep in close contact as does Sellers and Jack Petersen. They ALL seem to include San Diego in their future.


My health problems appear to be resolved; my initial scare and concern proved benign. Three units of blood in this area means I am now partially Latino. Two weeks after prostate surgery, I had a second tumor removed from the bottom of my left foot and come Monday, the stitches from that surgery will be removed. These two events, plus the need to be with my sister Wanda who had a breast and 23 lymph nodes removed (all malignant) the day the Nashville event took place, prevented my attendance. I can now drive again and, come Monday, will be able to walk again.

Three years ago, I became an Honest-to-God Texan and I want to report that just becoming a Texan doesn't afford you any of the appealing side effects such as "Things are BIGGER in Texas." After I was given my driver's license and tax number, I rushed home to check---nothing is different!!! And with three units of whole Hispanic blood, I assumed at least I would develop easier my lust for the Spanish language. That, too, is a failure; Lily, my black Labrador, still knows more English than I know Spanish! Marie and I are planning on San Diego; this will be her first such adventure.

Life in "Magic Valley," for me, remains exciting. I am very active with my tutoring role; I tutor 3rd and 4th graders, kids of migrant parents, to develop their reading skills and in some small way, make an effort to turn the course of their lives around. I also tutor adults toward the G.E.D. Last year, I was selected "Tutor of the Year" for the school district which had over 700 tutors---I'm very proud of that, and for people like us, tutoring is very, very rewarding. I highly recommend it to all who wish to justify the space they take up on Earth.

Dr. Roger L. Grief Former Camp 10 M.D. Honored By John Hopkins Univ.

Roger L. Grief, M.D. was among the 1941 graduates of the Johns Hopkins Medical School who were recently honored on their 50th anniversary. A special supplement to the Hopkins Medical News contained information on Dr. Grief's career as a successful medical practitioner.

Dr. Grief served in the Naval Reserve during WWII as a Lieutenant in the Medical Corps. His service included a tour of duty with SACO Unit Ten as its medical officer. Following SACO duty, Dr. Grief served on the destroyer U.S.S. Waller, and subsequently completed his naval tour of duty in 1946 at the U.S. Naval Medical Research Institute at Bethesda, MD. After serving as assistant physician at Rockefeller Institute Hospital in New York City from 1947 to 1953, Dr. Grief joined Cornell University Medical Hospital where he eventually became chairman of the physiology department. He retired from the chairmanship of the department in 1982 and was named emeritus professor of physiology.

Dr. Grief is remembered in SACO Unit Ten as the innovator of the gentian violet system of recognition or identification. As written up in Roy Stratton's "SACO - The Rice Paddy Navy" in the chapter on Unit Ten, when the time came for the Chinese battalions to draw weapons and equipment some system of identification had to be devised to insure that only the qualified Chinese troops drew them. The Americans at Camp Ten were stymied until Doc Grief came forth with the idea of painting a number on the back of each Chinese guerrilla qualified to draw a weapon with gentian violet from the sick bay. A day or so before the issuance of weapons and equipment, each qualified guerrilla got a gentian violet number painted on his back. When the men came through the line to draw weapons they were checked by the Americans for their gentian violet number.

Dr. Grief has continued to maintain his contacts with the Nationalist Chinese. In 1983 he was Visiting Professor of Physiology at the National Taiwan University and the National Defense Medical College at Taipei.

He and his wife, Alice, continue to live in New York City.

PAUL A. WEST

January 2, 1991

(Letter from Mrs. West)

30 September 1991

My husband, Paul A. West, Jr., chief petty officer with the Yangtze River Unit (Camp 13), a very isolated group that went to Hankow to clear out all Southwest China Navy and Marine personnel, passed away January 2, 1991. He was 82.

We attended one of the SACO conventions here in San Francisco ('73), but none since.

I know if he were here today, he would have liked to attend your coming celebration of the 80th anniversary of the Republic of China, the Double Tenth (in Taiwan Oct.'91). It is quite a coincidence that as I was cleaning out the garage today, I found a metal cabinet, tucked away in the back of a drawer, a large packet of letters from my husband during his active duty in SACO. The letter I happened to read was dated October 9, 1945. In the letter he mentioned that "tommorow is a big holiday for China, the 10th day of the 10th month." (He compares it with our 4th of July.)

I was delighted to find the letters; I just had a roll of 35mm film developed ... though 50 years old, the pictures are extremely interesting though not real

sharp. A Lt.Col.Terry Carlson (a Vietnam Vet), had corresponded with Paul, asking if he had any mementos, medals, flags, uniforms, maps, etc. Paul sent him what he could find, but he couldn't find the silk flags of China and Japan, nor the silk map marked with the route they took.

Paul and I planned to write a book together on his experiences, but didn't make it ...

In this October 9, 1945 letter, Paul mentions that the Army had just started a shuttle service to Shanghai and "scuttlebutt has it, for the time being, no further Navy personnel will be handled. If it's true, am sure it is only temporary. Other scuttlebutt is the Arizona has a two-day job to do here and then we can start to be moved; also the Queen Mary is in Shanghai and will be used as transportation to the States. It's all scuttlebutt, darling, and there will be lots more!"

What a wonderful day it was when the right scuttlebutt was for real!

Clayton R. Mishler, 83, died suddenly in Austin, Texas on Saturday, February 1, 1992.

He is survived by his beloved wife, Audrey, one son, Craig W. Mishler of Anchorage, Alaska; daughter-in-law, Barbara; and granddaughter, Susan. Also surviving is one brother, Edward, and his wife Marcia of Edmore, Michigan and several nieces and nephews.

Mr. Mishler was born February 17, 1908 in Johnstown, PA. He was employed for 32 years as Medical Administrator of the U.S. Veterans' Hospital, the Detroit District office, the area office in Minneapolis, MN and the Central office in Washington, D.C. He retired to Austin, TX in 1970.


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
